^bThe Social Science and Western History Perspective Areas can be met through major requirements; the African Americans', Appalachians', and Women's and the International (World Culture option) Perspective Areas can readily be met by options within the department.

^cStudents interested in this major are strongly recommended to begin language study as soon as possible to ensure progress through the major. Any student who has proven proficiency up to a 103 level, or who has taken the TOEFL exam, may meet the International Perspective requirement either through further language study, or through appropriate non-language coursework.

^dShould be taken in the Fall Term of the sophomore year.

^eA student may petition the department to substitute HIS 490A (Independent Study with ALE) or 490B (Ind. Study w/o ALE) for HIS 406. All of these courses require senior standing.

NOTE: All majors must meet the department's standards for effectiveness in written and oral communication.

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
